John Carpenter: Soldier and Model Citizen of Lititz

John Carpenter was a veteran and member of the Grand Army of the Republic. Enlisting in 1863 at the age

of 16, he was eager to enter and fight in the Civil War. After enlistment and training, John and his fellow comrades were sent to fill the gaps of Colonel Hambright's regiment at Chancellorsville.

Carpenter was along with Sherman's army during the famous march to the sea. He escaped unhurt until March 1865 at Battle of Bentonville. A bullet had passed through his shoulder, but luckily missed the bone. During that same afternoon, one of his fingers was shot off. The loss of blood prevented his escape, and as a result, he was among those sent to Libby Prison in Richmond, Virginia.

After the war he returned home. In May of 1918 he erected an American flag on an eighteen-foot pole over two brass cannons which were once at the Lititz square. He stated that the cannons didn't seem right to him because the flag did not fly over them. So he decided to supply one. Yearly, on the anniversary of the Battle of Bentonville, Carpenter would display the flag over these cannons. When not on display, it hung above his bed so he could always sleep under the stars and stripes.

The Bible he is holding in the photo was carried by him during his enlistment in the Union Army, 79th Division, PA Volunteers, and he had also carried it on the famous march with General Sherman. It was also with him during the time he spent in Libby and Andersonville prisons. This Bible, photograph, and other personal items and documents were recently donated to the foundation by a descendant.

Memorial Day encampment in 1920 in the Lititz Springs Park. John Carpenter, American and Lititz hero, would pass away five years later at the age of 78.


In The News

He also built the stone wall and arch in front of the house shown here. Begun in March 1927, he finished the home in April, 90 years ago this year.
