### Dr. James C. Brobst - Lititz Medical Pioneer


On February 19,1915 the Lititz Express reported the following: "Dr. James C. Brobst, the well-known physician, died at his home on Broad Street, this borough, at 10 o'clock, Monday morning, from a complication of diseases." On that date, Lititz lost one of it's well-respected, prominent,

caring citizens known throughout all of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Brobst was born in Rehrersburg, Pennsylvania in 1844 and became vale-

dictorian of his class from F&M College in the early 1860's. He then spent four years of college at the University of Pennsylvania. During these years, he served in the Union Army as Assistant Surgeon of the 46<sup>th</sup> P.V.I. After a and year and a half, he was discharged due to the war coming to a close. He then began a full-time practice in Leesport (Berks County). By 1873, he was now practicing in Lititz where he

replaced the family medical practice of Dr. J.H. Shenk who had been the doctor in Lititz for some years. His medical practice was located at 25 E. Main St. (now Clementine's). The building was the original 1796 Dr. Levi Hull house, the first drug store in Lititz. At this address, Dr. Brobst founded The Inland Chemical Company "manufacturer of proprietary medicines".



In 1895,after the retirement of A.R. Beck, the Headmaster of Beck School for Boys located at 125 S. Broad St., Brobst bought

the Beck school building and established a sanitarium. He continued the name Audubon Villa as Beck had for his school. Audubon Villa Sanitarium combined therapy and rehabilitation through exercise and diet for patients suffering various ailments.




### **Dr. James Brobst—Continued:**

In 1906 Brobst sold his main street drug store to L.N. Moyer and moved into Audubon Villa. This transaction to Mr.Moyer led to a line of Lititz druggists. Moyer eventually moved across the street to a larger building at 40 E. Main Street. He sold this business to Clyde Benner in 1941 who advertised "the only 5 cent cup of coffee in town". Benner sold his business to Walt Popejoy, but the name Benner's Pharmacy remained until Selina Man opened The Chocolate Cafe.




Dr. Brobst was an active member of the Lititz community. He was proprietor of the Springs Hotel, the Park House, and the Brobst building which housed the Lititz Post Office, Dr. Cameron Lane (a town dentist), and Reidenbach Photography Studio. This building was demolished for an addition to the then Farmers National Bank (now Susquehanna). Brobst was the second Burgess of Lititz, President of the Lititz Electric Co., Lititz Water Co., Lititz Lithographing Co., and was a Trustee of Linden Hall Seminary.

Dr. James C. Brobst was one of many Lititz citizens who played a role in what makes our town unique and why visitors enjoy spending time strolling through our friendly Moravian community.
