#### **25 Years of Beautiful Gardens at the Lititz Historical Foundation** Charlene Van Brookhoven

Sunday June 9, 1996 was a special day for The Lititz Historical Foundation. On that day the Mary Oehme Gardens was completed and ready for unveiling. After months of planning and many hours of work by dedicated LHF volunteers, the gardens to the rear of The Johannes Mueller House and The Lititz Museum were ready to be shared. With a large donation from William B. Oehme, Mary's husband, profits from LHF Tour

of Gardens and private individuals, there was enough capital to complete the project.

The extensive improvements tied the two houses together and would be the perfect setting for private and community functions. Derck and Edson Associates drew up the plans for the landscape architecture and also the management of the project to completion. A limestone retaining wall, fencing, walkways, benches, electricity and water were added as well as handicap accessibility. These amenities have added greatly to the tranquility and warmth to the Foundation property.



The Mary Oehme Gardens would not have been quite as lovely without many hands from dedicated volunteers. Each spring Carl Shuman, a water garden expert, cleaned the century-old fish pond and added water lilies to provide shelter for the resident goldfish. The Lititz Woman's Club tended the herb garden and Lititz Women of Today planted perennials, some of which still appear each spring.


