#### The 1908 Belshazzar Cantata

Lititz has become a destination for all things entertaining, exciting and feasting.

Crowds come from all over the east coast and beyond to enjoy whatever Lititz has to offer. There was a time when the oldest July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration in the U.S. was the busiest day of the year in our sleepy little town. Visitors as well as town's people came to witness the crowning of the Queen of Candles and to enjoy an extravagant fireworks display. July 4<sup>th</sup> in Lititz was, and still is, a day of sharing our town's Moravian heritage with visitors and family members alike.

Before there were faddish events planned to bring thousands of visitors to the streets of Lititz, both for adult and family entertainment, the town hosted many musical programs related to its religious history. One such program, Belshazzar, A Dramatic Cantata in Three Acts, was performed in the Lititz Springs Park in August of 1908 to a huge crowd of enthusiastic spectators. Belshazzar was a man who ruled Babylon during the years 553-539 BC.

He had a wall built around the city and took on a hedonistic lifestyle acquiring many wives and concubines while drinking and dining incessantly.

Needless to say God took command of this sin- filled city and Belshazzar was killed when the Persians conquered Babylon.

## Belshazzar Cantata Con't:

Almost 100 townspeople formed the cast of this open air stage. It measured 33' x 66' and was built over the basin of the Lititz Springs. A canopy of trees was the perfect backdrop for this two hour artistic presentation. The object of the cantata was to raise funds for The Young Men's Christian Association (Y.M.C.A.) in Lititz.

Even though the first evening was rained out, the remaining two nights entertained more than 2,300 people—more than the town's population in 1908.

NAME AND ADDRESS

The idea of bringing this Biblical story to Lititz was the innovation of Calvin S. Loeffler, a barber who lived at 40 N. Broad Street. He spent many months studying the story, the script, the music and the Lititz residents whom he felt were best suited to fit the roles of the 500 BC characters.

The music was conducted by Paul E. Beck, a renowned Lititz musician who conducted The Beck Concert Band. In 1918, Paul Beck became the first State Supervisor of Music in the State Department in the Commonwealth of Pa. - a very respected position.

The band shell in the Lititz Springs Park was built in 1937 to honor Mr. Beck and his musical accomplishments.

In 1908 the Belshazzar Cantata was quite a large undertaking in the small town of Lititz.

An outside visitor, who attended all three performances, was heard to say: "Without question it was the finest musical event ever held in Lititz."

More than 20 artisans will be on site demonstrating antique crafts, and many will offer their handmade items for sale at this free entry event.



#### Our Annual Plant Exchange is May 3!

The Lititz Historical Foundation in conjunction with the Lititz Garden Club will hold its Annual Plant Exchange on Sunday, May 3rd at 1:30 PM. The event will be held in the Mary Oehme Gardens, behind the museum buildings at 137-145 East Main Street in Lititz. The event is rain or shine.

The plants to exchange must be perennials and must have identification tags for each plant. Each plant must be placed in a container for transportation.

Upon arrival, a ticket will be handed out for each plant.

The plants must be placed in categories including: Sun, Shade, Exotic, Bulbs, Herbs and Ground Cov-



er. These tickets can be redeemed for another plant after all plants are placed in the categories and the attendees have some time to explore the categories.
