Adam E. Showers—Spanish-American War Veteran

The year 1898 saw the Spanish-American War between the United States and Spain. The cause of this short-

lived war was to support the independence of Cuba over the country of Spain and also to protect US business interests with Cuba.

On April 25, 1898, war was declared, and in order to help supply soldiers for the impending conflict, a recruiting office was opened April 15 in the city of Lancaster. Adam E. Showers of Lititz was one of the first men to enlist. He was sent to the Presidio in San Francisco, a military post, and trained to become a soldier.

He then was shipped to the Philippines. Because this war only lasted eight months, Mr. Showers was shipped to Northern China to help during the Boxer Rebellion, another short-lived conflict. In 1902 he returned to Lititz and with his wife Mary Kling Showers, began their family of ten children.

Adam Showers opened a small eatery in the basement of the then Lititz Springs Hotel. Competition with the hotel restaurant made it difficult to have a successful business so in 1910 he relocated to Penn Township and became a farmer. Eventually he moved his family to the town of Lititz and worked at The Animal Trap Company.

In order to remember a man who willingly enlisted in the military in 1898 and to help preserve the integrity of his

country, Adam's family has lovingly donated a personal collection of his years served.

Program to Focus on History of Conestoga River

Join us at the Lititz Public Library on Saturday, January 28th at 1:30pm for a free community presentation. We will be welcoming local historian and author Donald Kautz.

This presentation takes a brief stroll through the history along the Conestoga River. We will consider the historic conditions along the Conestoga, and we will look at the effects that settlement of the county has had on the river and what steps can be taken to ensure that the generations to come are able to enjoy this natural beauty.

The Conestoga River meanders for sixty miles through the fertile farmlands of Lancaster County. From early Native American inhabitants to the European settlers who made the Conestoga Valley their home, the river has provided sustenance and transportation for generations. Victorian era resorts and hotels were built along the river, providing new recreational activities as steam power drove innovative forms of transportation and waterpower.

As the region developed and the population grew, the river paid a heavy price in increased pollution from sewage runoff and industry. Conservation efforts toward the end of the twentieth century through the present day have restored the river's beauty and recreational reputation. Join author and photographer Donald Kautz as he takes a journey on the historic waters of the Conestoga River.

Highlighted in the parlor of the Lititz Historical Foundation museum is Mr. Showers' full uniform, photos of him during the conflict; several medals he earned as a soldier; a photo of Mr. and Mrs. Showers on their 50th wedding anniversary; and a group photo of the "coffee committee" of the Moravian Church including Mr. Showers.

This collection, donated by the third generation of the Showers family, is a history of one Lititz man and how he served his country in the Spanish-American War and Boxer Rebellion. This Lititz family history will be preserved through the safekeeping at the Lititz Historical Foundation.
