Froebel Stars

A Froebel star is a decorative, three-dimensional star made from folded and woven paper strips most commonly used as Christmas ornaments.

Friedrich Froebel was born in Germany in 1782 and became an early childhood educator. His view on education for young children was to emphasize learning with play rather than being seated in a classroom hour after hour. Froebel's thinking was to teach young children how to appreciate their youth rather than guide them into an adult world. He used wooden blocks and different sizes of paper and objects found in nature to bring out creativity to stress each child's unique developmental skills.

Froebel opened the first kindergarten (German translation "garden of children") in Blankenberg, Germany in

1837. His description came from the thought that children were like plants who had to be nurtured and cared for. He taught both boys and girls how to work with their hands using origami (paper folding) as a means to not only teach hand/eye coordination but also mathematical principles. He developed a star that needed no glue or tape to hold its shape which would have been quite easy for small hands.

Through the years the original Froebel Star became known as an Advent star in Germany as well as the Nordic countries; however in the US it is referred to as a Danish, German or Christmas star. In Moravian communities this small paper star is not to be confused with the traditional 26-point Advent star which is hung the first Sunday in Advent until Epiphany (January 6). This star symbolizes the star of Bethlehem and the anticipation of the coming of Christ or "Jesus the Light of the world."



The three-dimensional Froebel star can be made in about forty steps. The proper sized paper strips and folding instructions are available at The Lititz Historical Foundation's gift shop as well as already assembled stars in three different sizes.

Street Stars Still Shine Bright After Nearly 90 Years

One can't help but notice the beautiful stars which adorn the downtown streets lamps each Christmas season. In 1937, the Lititz Chamber of Commerce decided that these "stars of lights" would be placed on top of three lights at the square as well as on seven fixtures nearby.

That year on Christmas Eve, a special community carol sing took place at the square at 10:30pm. It was on that evening that the community gazed upon the stars for the very first time. More stars were added, and by

1940 Lititz boasted twenty-two more.

Due to this increase, the placement was extended — they would be lined along Broad Street from Orange to Lincoln Avenue; and from Main to Cedar.

By 1945, the count was up to thirty-eight stars; and since 2022, 45 shine throughout the downtown.
